The wheels are in motion for the 2009 Finals in Washington. The NW team of Advisors has swung into action to begin the task of preparing for the upcoming finals. This is going to be an excellent event if the brand new site and pre planning that I have seen are any indications. Plan now to qualify and attend. This will be an event not to be missed.

Many have noticed that attendance at our events is declining. There are many reasons for this and local qualifiers are also dealing with the same problem. We need sponsorship support/dollars, but we need to give something to the sponsor in return. We need spectators, but we need to give something to them in return also. There is a vital inter-relationship between sponsors, event, and spectators. The event can not be expected to grow and prosper (or even tread water) when the sponsors and spectators are not catered to. It's easy to say that sponsor dollars are down because of the economy or changes in the hobby. The reality is that we are not providing something of value to the sponsor. If the event makes a commitment to promote itself, attract pilots/builders and put on a show for spectators, then sponsors will have a reason to get involved and contribute. If the event makes a commitment to put on a show, then the event will attract paying patrons. If the event makes a commitment to rewarding pilots/builders who travel such great distances, then the show will be that much better and the sponsors will have more reason to get involved.

These areas are completely intertwined. The Masters and qualifiers can grow and prosper but only if a commitment is made to grow the event so that sponsors will want to participate with us in these events, rather than having to go to them each year with hands out for their donations. It is important, perhaps now more than ever, that we commit ourselves to becoming something of value to sponsors and spectators so that we can establish this event into the future.



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Thoughts from the Editor;

We often see the phrase "Keeping the Dream Alive". I never met Harris Lee and could not find anything about the Dream anywhere, so I asked former National Chairman Earl Aune to write something up—he sent me the eulogy he wrote for Harris, which pretty much sums it up. Here it is:

A Tribute to Harris Lee
14 June 1922 - 30 April 1998

"Harris Lee had a dream. Yes, 22 years ago he had a vision.... A vision of people getting together to have fun. He understood the importance of building memories, together. He understood the importance of having fun.

"Today, May 9th 1998, we get to celebrate his life, his memories, and his love.

"As a Naval Aviator in WWII he flew F6F Hellcats off aircraft carriers in the Pacific, a very dangerous job to say the least. It took nerves of steel to climb into the cockpit and fly off the deck of a fast moving carrier headed into battle. Each flight brought about a stark reality that there was a good chance you might not make it back. Many did not. Harris did, and he was proud of his service. His government was proud of him as well and awarded him the Distinguished Flying Cross medal. He would often joke with others that may have flown in one of the other services. In one such humorous discussion at the 1986 Championships banquet with ace Air Force pilot Frank Klibbe, Harris identified "pilots" as those that guided boats in and out of harbors but airplanes are flown by Naval Aviators!

"His love for aviation was unbounded. After the war, he found that building and flying model airplanes held a similar fascination with flight. But the models of that day looked more like toys rather than full size aircraft. He built models that looked like full size airplanes, airplanes that he flew in the war, scale model airplanes was the way to go he envisioned. He dreamed of someday when the air was full of these scale aircraft, when the ground was covered with people having fun.

"Harris founded an organization that has enriched the lives of people, thousands of people, peo-

ple who enjoy building and flying scale model aircraft. Harris saw scale modeling as a catalyst to bring people together as they enjoy watching the characteristics of flight, something he loved dearly.

Ask a scale modeler anywhere in the world who is Harris Lee and they will tell you, without hesitation, that he is the Father of the Scale Masters, our mentor, our leader who has built the most prestigious scale contest circuit on the face of the earth, the U.S. Scale Masters.

"Interestingly enough, here is a unique combination of his love for aviation and his love for people, brought together under one theme.

With the help of a few of his close friends, he structured a series of 25 regional contests all across the country. He sent the winners his personal congratulations. These winners then went on to compete at the Grand Championships that is held annually in the fall. The concept worked. People came and had fun.

More people came, more people got involved. They came to visit with old friends and make new friends as well. The dream is alive. For 18 years he nurtured this, guided this, and it grew, and it is good.

For this, we celebrate his life and the rich heritage he has left for us to care for.

We will keep his dream, we will build his dream, and we are proud of the memories he has given us and grateful for the friends we now have as a result of his dream.

"He is now in his dream, where dreams come from. We will miss him dearly. I look for you in the gentle breezes, my friend."
